On January 6th we lost a great supporter and contributor to our Foundation.

Foundation News Editor and former National Director Thelma Lysne passed away after a lengthy struggle with Cancer. It is worth noting that Thelma's participation in Sons of Norway activities, with local Lodges, our District Lodge and our Foundation, remained active up until a month before her passing.

Thelma's Sons of Norway activities outside of her home lodge Leif Erickson in Kamloops, began when she was elected to the position of Secretary on the District Board in 1996, a position she held for four years. This was followed by active involvement in District Cultural programs with special emphasis on conducting Hardangersøm workshops at various lodge and district events, including our annual District Heritage Camps.

Thelma joined our Foundation Board of Directors as a National Director in 2014. Her immediate thought was that she wanted to be a working member. This led to establishing our Foundation News. The plan would be to publish the News four times a year and would include information on support and fundraising programs. An important component of each fall issue was inclusion of our Bursary (Scholarship) winners.

When Thelma reached the end of her four year director term, she received news about a progressing cancer. As sad as this would be, she decided that she would continue publishing our Foundation News. By this time, we had produced 15 issues and more were planned. I fully realized Thelma's dedication to the News and suggested that if she thought it possible that she could continue with the News as long as she felt well enough to do it. That she did, and we are very thankful for that.

Mange takk, Thelma for your many contributions to Sons of Norway and Sons of Norway Foundation in Canada.

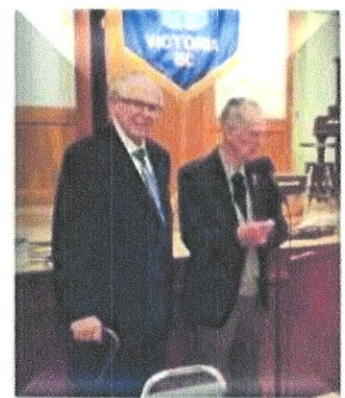

FOLKEHØGSKOLE BURSARY

This is a Bursary I have had a lot of fun researching. It is available from the Sons of Norway Foundation in Canada and offered to all **Canadian** individuals.

There are 85 Folkehøgskoles in Norway divided in two categories:

1. **LIBERAL** (51) These Folkehøgskols have no particular faith. The core principles are linked to establish values common in Norwegian values and culture. They are owned by foundations, organizations or countries.
2. **CHRISTIAN** (34) Christian Folkehøgskoles are owned or closely connected with Christian organizations or denominations. Some of these schools may have Christianity as a compulsory subject or will offer voluntary bible study groups and meetings.

These schools have no required curriculum but offer career discovering opportunities. You have graduated from high school and have plans to work or attend college, but are not sure what you want to do. You might consider taking a break from the cycle of study-exam for a while. Consider a Norwegian *folkehøgskole* or folk high school as a great way to put studying behind you and set yourself on a path of gaining confidence, creativity, maturity and self-knowledge on your way to your life long career.

These 85 Folk Schools offer over 300 subjects including theater, sports, dance, arts, media, music, outdoor life, travel, language, culture, sustainable environment, rehabilitation and many more. The enrollment each year is approximately 7,500 students with the smallest school having 40 students and the largest around 200. The schools are situated in almost every area of Norway from north to south. Each school has one main *linjefag* or core curriculum. There is also a *fellesfag*, which is a common subject that includes everyone.

Folk high schools are a long-standing institution in Norway, dating back to the late 19th century. They were instituted by a Danish educator, N.F.S. Grundtvig who opposed the routine memorization associated with academies, which he felt had little to do with daily life and future accomplishments.

A STORY OF SUCCESSFUL ACHIEVEMENTS WITH THE HELP FROM OUR FOUNDATION

I have been a recipient of SONFIC scholarships and bursaries over my post secondary, graduate and post graduate studies. I hold a RN (Camosun College), BSN (UVic), and Masters of Nursing (USQ) as well as a graduate program at the University of Oslo Summer School in International Health.

I am first generation Canadian from Scandinavian parents and have been a member of Sons of Norway since my youth. Ironically, this initial reluctance on their part helped me to win when the issue became heightened news to Canadian lodges as it appeared to make us 'second class' members in the view of the then Int'l organization. Thankfully much has changed since that time.

I have 16 year old son, who is keen on perhaps attending folk high school in Norway, after graduation. I am also engaged to a Norwegian man (& active member of Eidsvold 7-53) – hence Norwegian heritage is a big part of our life at home.

“Stamps have always played an important part in our lives. Saving those stamps and passing them to your Foundation Director or President of your Lodge is one of the easiest way to help your Foundation. In Issue 25 I would like to take you on a journey back in time about eighty years to the 1940’s when the post Office had to deal with getting the mail delivered in Canada from Norway.

During this very traumatic period in History contact and news from relatives and friends in Norway was very important. If you or a relative were living in Norway I would like to relay a little story about your letters.

My father after working as a fisherman and caretaker at Rivers Inlet in the 1920’s moved to New Westminster and was hired by the Post Office to deliver mail. During the difficult years of the 1940’s on an average of three (3) times a week he would come home with a letter from someone in Norway. This letter was passed to dad by another postman to translate the writing and find the correct person or address. As far as I can remember every letter reached the loved one living in the New Westminster area. I hope every community in Canada had an Elof (Joe) Madsen that was able to keep communication between loved ones in Norway and Canada.”
