This stage name was inspired by the constant storms of facial twitching and blinking he experiences due to Tourette's Syndrome. He arrived at Eurovision not just to showcase his music, but to celebrate the fact that living with a debilitating condition doesn't have to stand in the way of achieving your dreams.

Lyrics for "Fallen Angel" were born out of TIX's own experiences with bullying and mental health issues. He feels a lot of people can relate to the latter, after living through 2020 and the continued pandemic. TIX made it to the final round of the epic contest, which typically draws a television audience of 200 million.

Hope Floats

Inspired by Norway's stave churches, Hope Cathedral is a unique structure, floating on a barge near the mouth of the river Glomma in Fredrikstad, Norway. It is constructed out of timber and over a thousand plastic fish boxes. The multi-colored fish boxes, recovered during shoreline clean-ups, have been recycled into jewel-like roof tiles.

Solveig Egeland, an artist and cultural advisor to the Church of Norway's Diocese of Borg, was inspired to start the project back in 2018 as she witnessed more and more plastic waste being deposited on her favorite beaches. In their stead, she envisioned an edifice of many colors rising from the sea. That fall, 35 volunteers banded together to realize her dream.

They have since been joined by thousands of people from across the globe, binding people of different faiths and nationalities together into a supportive, sustainability-focused community. Now nearly finished, Hope Cathedral was opened to the public on June 5, 2021.

Norwegian Bunad

Often the words bunad and folk costume are used to describe traditional Norwegian dress. Let me distinguish between the two.

The bunad is a festive costume used today in Norway and is very similar to the costumes used in the early years. They also resemble the geographical areas where they were first created.

The folk costume is thought of as the everyday and holiday clothes worn in a specific area of Norway. Note that the design of these costumes must differ from district to district. These folk costumes were used in the last century and earlier! It is incredible to think that the costumes were worn every day. There were work clothes, going to church clothes and festive clothes all designed for the specific area you lived in. Not only did the people have to concentrate on the various usages but also the four seasons came into play. Shawls, jackets and head coverings were all used at various times of the year. Being married and unmarried dictated what costume you wore. Married women often switched to black and always had to cover their heads with a scarf or cap. Unmarried girls wore colored costumes and wore ribbons in their hair. Silver was used for broaches and buttons, but the married women had to outshine the unmarried girls in this adornment. Status also played a role in costume wearing. Usually, the wealthy had finer garments and more silver.

Today there are 450 different variations of the Norwegian bunad. As mentioned before, these costumes are worn in large or small districts that have definable borders. There can be several districts in a country or in a long valley.

The bunads were created using the distinct patterns of the folk costumes in the various areas. Interestingly enough, the bunad designs have been so refined that they are now timeless, never being outdated.

A woman by the name of Hulda Garborg investigated the bunads in all areas of Norway. In 1903, she wrote the first bunad book in Norway. She continued her research and wrote later editions.

Her interest in bunads influenced people to once again to use them. Through her research she was able to do slight changes and alterations to the patterns that would make them more suitable to the times and conditions. She enforced the idea that the material used must be homespun Norwegian material which had to be solid and warm. Hulda valued the culture that resonated in each district. She was an inspiration who set the Norwegian people on the path of "bunad wearing" once again.

As a result of her zeal, Norwegians wear the bunad for various celebrations including weddings and important birthdays, 17th May and folk dances. It's also often worn on religious occasions such as baptisms, confirmations, and at Christmas.

This month, I've picked the Gudbrandsdalen bunad to show you. This bunad is made from a solid-colored wool material which is usually blue, black or white. The flower pattern is embroidered in a variety of colors on the skirt, bodice and cap. The skirt is loosely pleated with an attached short bodice. The blouse is made of white linen or cotton with tating on the turned down collar and cuffs. An apron made of the same material as the skirt and with the same embroidery can be used. The bunad is worn with black stockings and black shoes with silver buckles. The broaches and cufflinks are of silver too. A hanging purse made of the same wool and embroidered like the rest of the bunad is hung on the left side using a silver purse closure.

To my knowledge, it will be the only Scandinavian bakery on Vancouver Island.

I'm hoping the members of North Star Lodge can help me! What I need right now is practice, practice, practice, and genuine feedback on how I can improve my recipes. In other words, I need hungry and honest Scandinavians :)

I can deliver around Nanaimo every second Sunday (twice a month).

I can take orders by email (leah.solveig.hayward@gmail.com) or by phone/voicemail (250-634-0315). Deadline to order is the Friday before delivery.

Here are the products I'll offer (I hope lodge members will request others!):

- Danish rye bread: 100% rye sourdough w/ sunflower seeds (1 loaf - \$5)
- Swedish limpa: Sweet rye bread w/ anise, caraway, orange zest, and dark beer (1 loaf - \$5)
- Lompe: potato flatbread rounds, perfect for hot dogs! (pack of 6 - \$5)
- Classic rye crispbread: Wasa style (pack of 6 - \$5)
- Hearty seed crispbread: w/ sesame, sunflower, pumpkin, and poppy seeds (pack of 6 - \$5)
- Bollor: w/ raisin, chocolate, or plain cardamom (pack of 6, single flavour - \$5)
- Cinnamon knots: knotty little cinnamon buns! (pack of 6 - \$5)
- Verdens beste: Norway's "official" cake! Soft butter cake, crispy meringue, creamy filling, toasted almonds (9x13" - \$20)
- Fyrstekake: cardamom tart w/ sweet almond filling (9" round - \$20)



Norwegian Higher Education Records Set in 2020

In 2020, Norwegian universities and colleges experienced a record year in number of students. In fact, over 51% of bachelor students completed their studies in 2020, making it the first time more than half finished their studies without any delay. The number of students that graduated from Norwegian universities rose about 2,400 people from 2019 to 2020. Additionally, the number of applicants increased 4% from 2019 to 2020. Interestingly enough, some of this growth has been attributed to the coronavirus situation. In an interview this year, Minister of Research and Higher Education Henrik Asheim (H) stated "Experience from previous crises shows that more people want to get an education when times are bad. We saw that last year [2020], and we see that again this year. For the knowledge nation Norway, this is good news because we need more wise minds in all sectors." 2021 is following the positive increase from 2020 and may see even higher growth.

Changed name to "Salmon" to get free sushi

Taiwanese authorities are asking people to stop changing their names. Several people in the country have changed their name to "Salmon" recently.

"Salmon" has become a popular name in Taiwan. Many young Taiwanese have changed their names. Part of the reason is an offer from a chain of restaurants.

A chain has promised that people can get free sushi this week. But then they must have the Chinese characters for salmon in their name—Gui Yu. Five other friends can also have free sushi.

The result is that many have changed their names, according to local media. In recent days, around 150 people have turned up to change their name. Most are young.

"I just changed my name earlier today. Now my name is "Bao Cheng Gui Yu". We have already eaten over 7,000 Taiwanese dollars' worth, a student told a local TV channel.

That sum is around 2,000 kroner. [US\$225] Bao Cheng Gui Yu can be translated as "explosive, beautiful salmon."

Several have various different combinations of names containing salmon. Other examples are "salmon prince," "meteor salmon king" and "salmon fried rice."

"I have changed my first name to 'Salmon.' Two of my friends did so, too. We'll just change our names back afterwards," says a woman to the TV channel SET TV.

But not everyone is happy that people are changing their names. The authorities are asking people to stop.

"This type of name change is a waste of time. It also creates an unnecessary amount of paperwork," Chen Tsung-yen said Thursday. He is the Deputy Minister of the Interior.

"I hope people can be more rational," he says.

The offer ends Thursday. It has lasted for two days.

Skifter navn til «Laks» for å få gratis sushi

Myndighetene i Taiwan ber folk slutte med bytte av navn. Flere i landet har skiftet navn til «Laks» i det siste.

«Laks» har blitt et populært navn i Taiwan. Mange unge taiwanere har byttet navn. Noe av årsaken er et tilbud fra en kjede restauranter.

En kjede har lovet at folk kan få gratis sushi denne uka. Men da må de ha de kinesiske tegnene for laks i navnet sitt. Det er «Gui Yu». Fem andre venner kan også få gratis sushi.

Resultatet er at mange har byttet navn, ifølge lokale medier. De siste dagene har rundt 150 personer møtt opp for å bytte navn. De fleste er unge.

– Jeg endret nettopp navnet mitt i dag tidlig. Nå heter jeg «Bao Cheng Gui Yu». Vi har allerede spist for over 7.000 taiwanske dollar, sa en student til en lokal TV-kanal.

Summen er rundt 2.000 kroner. Bao Cheng Gui Yu kan bli oversatt som «eksplosiv, vakker laks».

Flere har flere ulike kombinasjoner av navn med laks. Andre eksempler er «lakseprins», «meteor laksekonge» og «laksestekt ris».

– Jeg har skiftet fornavn til «Laks». To av vennene mine har gjort det samme. Vi endrer bare navnet vårt tilbake etterpå, sier en kvinne til TV-kanalen SET TV.

Men ikke alle er fornøyd med at folk bytter navn. Myndighetene ber folk slutte.

– Denne typen navnebytter er å kaste bort tid. Det skaper også unødvendig mye papirarbeid, sa Chen Tsung-yen torsdag. Han er vise-innenriksminister.

– Jeg håper folk kan være mer rasjonelle, sier han.

Torsdag er det slutt på tilbudet. Det har vart i to dager.

Have you heard of the Kavli Prize?

While you may be familiar with the Nobel Peace Prize awarded by the Norwegian Nobel Committee, there is a newer, less-known prize in the news. The Kavli Prize recognizes scientific creativity and celebrates outstanding achievements in the fields of astrophysics, nanoscience, and neuroscience.

Established by Fred Kavli who was born on a small farm in Eresfjord, Norway, Kavli later moved to California. He was a physicist, entrepreneur, and philanthropist. His lifelong fascination with science led him to establish the U.S.-based Kavli Foundation in 2005. Since 2008, awards have gone to 54 scientists from thirteen countries including the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, Austria, France, Netherlands, Lithuania, Japan, Norway, Russia, Czechia, Sweden and Switzerland.

Nominations for The Kavli Prize open this year September 1 and close on December 1, 2021. The Norwegian Academy of Science and Letters will award three prizes in 2022, using the recommendations of independent committees for each field. Norway's Royal Family presides over a ceremony held in Oslo, where prize recipients receive a gold medal, scroll and cash equivalent to one million US dollars.
